Welcome to the first newsletter of 2024. Since our return from the Christmas break the children and staff have continued to work hard. Below are some highlights from across the school.



#### Curriculum update.

#### Nursery

This month has been a very busy one for our Nursery children, as we have all welcomed lots of new children into our setting. The children who have been with us since September have been helping them to follow the rules, showing them where to hang up their coats, and showing them how to share. We are very proud of them.

As part of our work on traditional stories, we have been busy making Gingerbread men, and tasting them. They were delicious! We have also been improving our fine motor skills tracing patterns on the gingerbread men and









#### Year R

Year R have started to learn their phase 3 sounds, which are digraphs and trigraphs. We will be continuing to recognise and use these phonemes in other contexts, not just in our phonics sessions. As part of our Dinosaur topic, the Year R children were lucky enough for Mummy Dino to leave us an egg to look after. The children wrote some fantastic instructions of how to look after a dinosaur egg. The topic really captivated the year group's imagination.





We have also learnt about Lunar New Year. The children enjoyed learning facts about Lunar New Year and sharing with the class what celebrations they partake in. This week, the children made pizza and wrote instructions for how they made them. They have also learnt about capacity. They really enjoyed using the language 'empty,' 'full,' 'half full,' 'nearly full,' and 'nearly empty.'





#### Year 1

In Year 1, we have been focusing on old toys for our history unit. As a result, the children explored the old toys in the classroom and even made their own cup and ball and split pin doll. They then wrote instructions about how they made these toys by using all their writing skills. The children have also sort old toys and new toys and have noticed that lots of new toys are made from plastic, whereas the old toys were made from wood and metal. In art, the children have developed their drawing skills by focussing on making light and dark tones and applying this to their drawing of an old toy. Lately the children have been learning about 'Toy Story' in English and have written fantastic character descriptions and written it as a story. The children are preparing for the Portswood School Toy Museum and are excited to show off all their learning.










#### Year 2

This half term we have been learning all about Katie Morag. We have thoroughly enjoyed learning all about the Island she lives on (The Isle of Struay).

Did you know that the Isle of Struay is based on the real Island that the author lives on? It's called the Isle of Coll and is off the coast of Scotland! After we found this out, we wanted to learn more about the Isle of Coll, such as places you can visit and things to do. We came up with some clever questions in our teaching of reading lessons and spent some time finding some of the answers to these. Using this as inspiration we created our own maps of the Isle of Struay in Geography. In English we have written a character description about Katie Morag, a setting description of the Isle of Struay and are currently writing letters to Katie Morag too!

We have been inspired by new vocabulary that we have found in our Katie Morag books and have thought carefully about other new and exciting vocabulary that we can include in our own work.







#### Year 3

This month Year 3 have started learning about Ancient Greece. We have been reading Greek myths in English, and we have recently written a persuasive letter in role as King Midas. We were able to empathise with the character and infer how he was feeling throughout the story, which helped us to write from his perspective. We have also read the story of Perseus and Medusa so that we could create and perform a dance based on scenes from the book. In art, we have read the story of Theseus and the Minotaur and will use this to inspire us when designing our own monsters. Our final piece of art will be created using different paper techniques to represent different features of the monster. We hope to use all of this information as inspiration for our own mythological



monster later this term!








#### Year 4

Year 4 have had a cracking start to 2024. Alongside some excellent maths, reading and English we have started to explore sound. A highlight of this topic has been learning about the human ear and making a play doh model showing how we hear.



We are very much enjoying our new geography topic about Antarctica and were lucky to have Mr May visit us and tell us all about his expedition there.





#### Year 5

It has been a fabulous couple of weeks since the winter holiday, and the children are working really hard. In English, we have been studying the legend of Beowulf, which has led to some amazing reading and writing outcomes. The children are currently writing their own legend narrative where their hero vanquishes their created hideous beast!.



Our geography topic about Italy is in full swing, and the children have shown amazing geographical skills in researching physical and human landmarks the country. They produced an amazing hand-drawn map in small groups. Soon we will erupt into a study of Mount Vesuvius.





In PSHE, we have been considering physical health and mental well-being, looking in detail at the benefits of exercise, personal hygiene and eating a balanced diet. In PE, we have been playing rugby, and performing and looking at the history of the Haka. Mrs Carpenter came to talk to us about praying the rosary in RE and, as a result, the children produced fantastic brochures on how to do this. Both Mr. May and Miss Deller would like to thank all parents and carers for their work with the children reading at home, especially with the new books that we have been reading in class and sending home. We have already seen amazing progress despite this only just starting.



#### Year 6

Year 6 have had a brilliant return to school after the Christmas break. They are loving their new history unit on The Victorians and so far have learned all about daily life in the Victorian period, the Industrial Revolution and have begun their learning on children at work. The culmination of this learning will be showcased at our Year 6 History Fayre on Friday 9 February – please check the letter for the timings.

We have also been really enjoying our English learning with children reading both Wild Boy and Oliver Twist.

Please can we take this time to say thank you to all of you taking the time to support your child at home with their homework and reading. We have seen an increased engagement with both of these and this will have a positive impact on your child's progress. Thank you for this. Can we remind you that reading should be happening at home daily and reading records should be brought into school every day to be shared with the teacher.
